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

Some considerations I wanted to call out. The oppressive summer heat can be tough on our cars. You might want to carry extra coolant with you on long drives but also check your tires. The very hot road surface can impact the tire

including nails and screws that may sit in the road. I have seen a number of flat tires this summer (on other people's cars) and I am sure some of this is attributable to the heat. Carry a depth and pressure gauge. And if you have a cabriolet, SPF 50 is recommended. Skid reMarks DAN FISHKIND - AUTOCROSS CHAIR



I had the best of times; I had the worst of times. This says it all about my autocross experience since I began in 2005. The downside to my experiences is the worst times seemed to stick and the best times were always bettered by another autocrosser. In the beginning, this was ok because the great thing about autocross is it is an individual sport. When you start out, if you manage to

beat your own times throughout the day, you have won. It doesn't matter how the other drivers have driven the course; you have improved. This is the mindset that all beginners should have. As your experience increases, and you become more skilled at reading the courses, you will start competing against others. That is when the real fun starts. This is similar, in a way, to golf. When you begin playing you are looking to improve your own score. As you improve then you start comparing your scores to others.

This competition helps you improve even further. One factor that might inhibit new drivers from trying autocross is intimidation. The good thing about autocross, as I mentioned earlier, is it is an individual sport. When you are a beginner at golf you get to your ball and hit, this keeps all others around you happy. With autocross it is the same thing. Get your car to the line and drive. That's it. There is no reason to be intimidated. You can drive as fast or slow as you like until you become comfortable. We know who the beginners are, so when you come to the line we happily leave more space between you and the car starting after you so you can relax and just concentrate on your driving, without having to worry about anything behind you. Sounds stress free to me.

The question I know all of you are asking now is, "If I have never autocrossed before, should I participate in an event now, this late in the season?" The answer, "Absolutely!" Veteran autocrossers are at every event and are always eager to get new people involved.

Events are newbie friendly and I can assure you that we will make you feel welcomed and comfortable. There are plenty of people who know what they are doing and will not hesitate to help the new guy or girl out. Take the first step

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

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Track Ramblings

FRED PACK - CO-CHIEF INSTRUCTOR



My Excellent Adventure

I spend my summers in Vail Colorado, which causes me to miss many track days since I don't have a track car here. A friend here used to let me drive his 911 GTS, but he rescinded that offer to keep his costs down, and last year I rented a "track car" for a weekend but it was expensive and so slow that I won't do that again. I also have a friend here with a lovely Ferrari who has no

track experience, and I knew about a Novices Only track day organized by the PCA Rocky Mountain Region, so I asked him if he'd be interested in attending it with me as his instructor. He said, "Yes", so we went.

The car is a 2021 Ferrari F8 Spider. Porsche people like us could call it a "Ferrari Boxster", since it is an opentop mid-engine car. Unlike our Boxsters it only has a front trunk (which is very small) since the engine – a 3.9 liter twin-turbo V8 extends so far rearward that there is no room for a rear trunk. [Score 1 for Porsche!] The car is only available with the Ferrari version of the PDK transmission. In fact, there are no manual transmission cars made any more by Ferrari.

As the instructor, I got to drive it for some laps on the track and can report that it is a more than a wonderful car. It should be since it costs more than \$300,000. It has superb electronic handling and braking features, so it was great fun to go into turns at full throttle, then brake as hard as possible followed by trail braking into the turn, with the car's gearbox seamlessly shifting sequentially down from 5th gear into 2nd. The car truly felt glued to the track. But the real excitement came from the gas pedal, because the F8 has 710hp. By contrast, the GT3RS has 'only' 518hp. When I stepped on the gas and caught up and passed other cars on the track, they would recede instantly far behind me as if the F8 had engaged Warp Drive.

As summer days turn to beautiful September weather hopefully with less heat and humidity we try as ever to keep our PCA members active in following their Porsche passions. At times, our many events keep us from doing more. However, please pencil in Wednesday, August 23rd from 7-9:30 for a wing night at Blazers Pub, 440 NY-22

in North Salem, NY. Our Porsche Post editor Ed Reiner's favorite watering hole!

Please pencil in either Wednesday, August 30th, and/ or Wednesday, September 6th for a second wing/pizza night at Patsy's Pizzeria, New Rochelle for another night on the Porsche trail. Please RSVP on Club registration. While we are working out some details for cost, please be prepared to pay a small per-head cost somewhere between \$20-\$25.

As we all know, we still have time left in the year to get out and enjoy our cars however, time flies, no pun intended, before we have to tuck our machines in for winter hibernation. So, we look forward to seeing an enthusiastic turnout to shake hands and eat some wings with our members. I invite any thoughts and ideas on other events or establishments you have in mind. I've written about this concept a few times, but now I want to illustrate a personal moment of reckoning with it. I spend a lot of time in Vail doing road biking and Colorado is very bike-friendly with many bike paths. Recently I was on one of these bike paths, which are about 8 feet wide, when I saw a woman and man on their bikes heading towards me. They were side-by-side. Rather than pull in behind the woman, the man moved more to his left, leaving me no room at all on the pavement to avoid a head-on collision. In near-panic I intentionally went off the pavement into the dirt and pebble verge, which was only about a foot wide, on my right side as the two bikers went by me. I had no idea at all how to avoid falling into the brush area on my right. Nor did I know how to get back on the pavement, which was elevated a few inches above the dirt area. I took a leap of faith and angled the bike back up onto the paved bike path.

Simply put, I reacted blindly to this incident and was very lucky to have avoided a fall. (My one bike fall about 8 years ago, which was also on pebbles, resulted in surgery.)

How does this relate to our track driving activities? I 'reacted' blindly, rather than 'responding' by calling up a stored set of behaviors to get out of trouble. I have since practiced going off the pavement onto the dirt verge on my bike and safely getting back onto the paved bike path, so I now have one stored set of responses.

the route. Many of the teams have become adept at answering the questions I ask. I try to make it easy to see the signs or landmarks noted in the questions but answering correctly requires understanding the General Instructions (the rules of the rally). I try to make the event competitive in addition to a fun drive on scenic roads. The Touring class is specifically for those who choose to enjoy the drive only. Something for everyone is always my plan. The theme is "Rally for Fun". Upon arrival at Osprey's Dominion Winery, the cars were parked with rows of grape vines as the backdrop. We enjoyed picnic lunches in our reserved area. (Results on opposite page).

The team of specially trained and qualified judges then scrutinized the cars (names withheld to protect the innocent). Cars were chosen by color using French Concours Rules (the cars the judges liked the best). After the scoring was completed the answers to the questions were explained. There weren't too many moans and groans when correct answers didn't align with what some thought they should be. I was lucky that no one had ripe vegetables available. All in all, everyone had a good time.



I Saw the Gap and I Took It

I saw a gap, and I took it! This phrase basically sums up what Porsche club racing is all about. This small phrase carries both high risk and high reward. The reward of a successful pass is; a better finishing position, maybe even a podium, and if a friend bragging rights. Or the risk of an unsuccessful pass, a spin-out, lower finishing position and the loss of bragging rights. Or worse yet, car contact, with a visit to the scrutineers and multiple forms, and possible probation or suspension (13/13 rule). That's a lot to think about in the heat of competition when that gap, and window of opportunity, can be fleeting. Better or worse, racers are not thinking this much when the transient gap appears. It's more of a visceral instinctive reaction of can I make it. PCA has many pages in the rulebook explaining the how, who, and when of passing. This article is about my experience in navigating the gap. I entered the PCA club race at the New Jersey Motorsports Park - Thunderbolt track - in August. At Thunderbolt, I was both on the receiving end of an opponent's decision and the instigator of a decision to take the gap, both of which ended in relatively minor damage and infractions for me but could have ended differently. In addition, I spun shortly after making a pass in tight traffic. Aside from this, it was a great race weekend.

The receiving end of the gap taken. Turn 3 (the kink) is a very fast right-hand turn in the early part of the backstretch, with a wide radius. The key to driving this turn is early application of gas with a fast exit from turn 2. The approach to turn 3 is far left with a later apex. No brake, but with a slight lift of the gas to help with turn in. Some racers claim to take it without lifting. Another Spec Boxster (SPB) I was racing, who was chasing me for a few laps, got a good run off the exit of turn 2. By the time we approached turn 3, there was a window of opportunity for my opponent to take and pass me in turn 3. He saw a gap and maneuvered nearly beside me at turn-in, clearly indicating his intentions to "take the gap". I gave him enough room to attempt an inside pass, but of course I intended to race him through the corner as any racer would do. By the apex, my opponent was next to me and beginning to power out, as was I, since I had the outside line. We were side-by-side at the exit. Instead of lifting slightly to avoid making contact, he continued to power

Consequently, Wham! At about 90-95 mph, he hit my car square-on door-handle to door-handle—his left to my right side. In his effort to keep pace he was not able to keep his car mid-track. I incurred a dent in front of my

rear tire, a scratch near my front tire and my passenger mirror was ripped off. I was a little stunned but stayed on track and after a brief assessment of the car continued racing. Unfortunately, I lost my position. The scrutineers decided I was not at fault as I gave room when my competitor "took the gap", thus avoiding a 13/13 penalty. My opponent, I suspect, was not so fortunate. Lesson learned – sometimes when you do all the right things, at the right place and within the rules, stuff happens. We patch things up, assess what happened and racing and life moves on.

The instigator of the gap taken. By race 3, I improved my starting position seven positions from my race 1 starting position. Now I was gridded mid-pack and was looking to improve my position. I was gridded next to my teammate, Mark Pensabene. Both of us are supported by Rudtner Racing. PCA club racing uses a rolling start, which means the race field follows a pace car two-by-two on the initial lap, then it slows down before the final turn to bunch up the field. The green flag flies and 30 or so cars go full throttle toward turn 1 in the hopes of gaining position. Not for the faint of heart, but pretty damn exciting. Everyone tries to jockey for position, anticipate the flag drop and even jump it a bit to get the slightest advantage. I was no exception.

I maneuvered into a nice center track position, as I don't like an inside line to turn 1. Mark was in front of me with another SPB to his left. I was ready to pounce at my first opportunity. I got a good start and advanced on Mark. The other SPB moved slightly to the left and there it was, "I saw a Gap". It didn't matter that Mark was my teammate at Rudtner's, had given me advice on many turns or that we were parked right next to each other in the garage, "I took the Gap".

I advanced to about halfway forward of his car when that gap suddenly appeared smaller than my initial assessment. We touched. A little bump. A scratch. A small ding. Who would notice? He finally gained advantage and was ahead at turn 1. Oh well, good try I thought. Let's race. I'm thinking no big deal, I'll just head to my garage bay after the race.

When the race was over and I'm in my garage I notice Mark parked in the scrutineer's garage bay. Oh boy was his car worse than I thought.





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Social Events LEE WALTON - SOCIAL CHAIR

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

Or you visualize a situation of going off the pavement at Lightning's Turn 1 onto the grass. Instead of reacting by turning the wheel to the right to get back on the track — and likely crashing into the barriers on the right side of the track, you respond by letting the car lose speed on the very large grass area to the left and then safely reenter the track towards Turn 2. Build up your library of mental situations for each track that you visit. You may truly save your day — I did once at Summit Point Main: I was approaching the very slow Turn 1 at high speed when my brake pedal went down to the floor. Uh Oh!!! I remembered that there is a runoff road slightly to the left. I safely went down there instead of crashing into the tire wall straight ahead.

Driven for Speed

PCA Club Racing is so much more than "Racing". iust camaraderie among the racers is really something that I wish everyone could be a part of. More than that there is a friendship that developed among the support teams as well as the mechanics that are the support for the drivers. This most recent PCA club race at

New Jersey Motorsports Park (NJMP) was no different. The trip to NJMP was hampered by heavy rains but once there and set up the weather would turn nice. Historically the weather at NJMP for this event is unusually hot. This year it was no different as temps for the three days were in the high 80s to 90s. Very hot for all three days of the three-day event.

We were very glad to have our close friend Marc Pensabene back racing after a long 13-month break from the competition. Paul Devany was with us for this event as well. Our friend Todd Roth was also competing still adorning the Rudtner's Racing Banner. It's always good to see Metro members Eugene Basha and Jason Nikic who run in the ever-popular 911 Cup class. The 911 Cup class contains the older air-cooled 911's.

My friends Mike Piera (CTV), Lee Lasberg along with (CTV) Dwayne Moses (POT), Eric Elezovic (CTV), Todd Pajonas (CTV), and Mark Weining (DEL) all have a hand in making the 911 Cup series very exciting to watch. After the day of racing as I walked through the paddock I saw Eugene resting with his feet on his car and his daughter Ema sitting next to him. I thought to myself, this is really what it's all about. (Photo on opposite page).

Metro NY members running in the faster Red group included long-time veteran instructor and friend John Montgomery. John was campaigning his GTB-1 classed Cayman. Also running GTB-1 were Metro members Eric Liu, Art Tsang and David Trinder Eric won the third race overall! Congrats to Eric on that hard-fought win. Longtime Metro Member Joe Doria ran his 996 Cup in GTC-3. Joe won his class in the 2nd and 3rd races as well after a

mechanical problem forced Steve Katz out of the races after a strong win in race 1. Metro member Baher Yanni ran his 997.2 Cup. Metro member Steven Dipaolo ran his beautiful GTC-8 Cup. To say the least Metro NY was well represented.

My focus is really in SPB (Spec Boxster). Some years ago, I had to have a sequential box car so I bought a GTA-2 classed World Challenge spec Cup. This car was one of the finest, fastest cars I had ever driven but after a year of running the car; it was clear that to run this "A" car competitively would take more money than I could spend. After this realization...enter SPB.

The competition in SPB is by far some of the very best. The SPB class is a strong class that usually contains 18-34 SPBs in a single race. Now that's competition. The fastest guys are usually a full second, sometimes two, faster than the rest of the field. These days I'm very happy to be able to keep these faster guys in eyeshot.

The first race at NJMP was run under super-hot/humid conditions. I can only try to explain to the unknowing what it's like to be nose to tail, door to door in a pack of 20 cars as you come around that last turn onto the front straight away waiting for that green flag to drop. You look at your RPM and try to pick the correct gear for the speed as you await your crew guys' voice. He yells into your ear, Green, Green, Green and you go. You hopefully have chosen your gear correctly and out-accelerate your competition looking for the right gap(s) to beat your surrounding competition to the first turn. You keep your right foot planted on the accelerator until the very last second before going to the brake hoping you keep clear of hitting the car in front of you at the same time not slowing too much as to let your fellow racers by.

The adrenaline that pumped so hard through your body just before the drop of that green seems to have gone away as it becomes all business going into turn one...4 wide going into turn one. What a rush. Three wide going through turn two. Still three wide into turn three, no brake no lift as you track out to the left hoping the car you can't see but is just to your left backs out of it and gives you a clear run into turn four. In a few laps, this all sorts itself out as you do your best to stay with the car in front of you while you try to keep the car behind you, behind you.

If you're good the car ahead of you becomes your "Rabbit". You try to chase your rabbit down. Now...If you do chase him down...do you out brake your opponent going into turn seven or do you wait and try to get a run on him out of turn 12? These situations go on lap after lap for 30 minutes.

After this first race, I was shot. I sat in the car for a few minutes gathering my composure. Once I climbed out I poured a cold bottle of water over my head to cool down. That race was a good one for all three of us with Marc running some of his fastest Thunderbolt laps ever. Paul had a great time battling it out with Devyn Koehler who we would get to know a bit better later that same day. Paul had some closer than usual situations arise as in one instance, after the race Paul's left mirror was nowhere to be found! There was another time when Paul had slight contact with Marc! I asked Paul what happened. Paul

looked me straight in the face and in all seriousness said "I saw a gap so I went for it." I could do nothing but smile. Each time I went to grid I was told "Position 17." Each and every race I started in position 17. In the first race, I finished in position 11, 6th in SPB. Marc was right behind me finishing in 9th in class.

Not bad in a field of 17. In race two I came in 8th in class with Marc coming in 9th and Paul in 12th. In the third race, I placed 7th in class with Marc finishing in 9th and Paul finishing 15th. All of the races went fairly well for us. We all had a blast and almost all the cars, except for one, came home in one piece. As soon as we were done we found ourselves immediately talking about the next race. Our next race at Summit would be the last race for most of us for the 2023 season.

I drove over there right away. He thought another car hit him and rightly-so went straight to the scrutineers after the race. I said it was me who made contact, but there was confusion as to my damage. Not sure the scrutineers believed me at first when I said the scratch, dent and missing mirror were from my incident the day before. Plus, my video wasn't recorded. The final assessment was I had a small scratch and Mark had a small dent.

But still more conversations, incident forms and video. The final assessment—I was at fault. Mark maintained his line and I moved into him. No argument from me, they were right. Lucky for me, the damage was light. They called it a rub-out and I was not subject to the 13/13 rule. Lesson learned – Life is full of risks that need to be judged on their merit. When you see a good opportunity, you've got to take it. No risk=no reward. Also, be honest and don't try to skirt the rules. I tried to initially avoid the scrutineer. It was the wrong call. Mark made the right decision to visit them. Sorry for the contact Mark, it was just racing.

The Spin

Toward the end of race 3, I was chased down by another SPB and passed in turn 1 but continued on the car's tail for another 2-3 laps. Between the turn 4 fast right-hander and the turn 5 left-hander, two SP911's clearly battling for their own positions appeared in our mirrors. But this is a tricky scenario, two slower SPB's contending for position and two faster SP911's also in their own battle. I wanted to let them by quickly without losing ground to my competitor. This becomes a delicate dance, and as the trailing car in my own battle there's a possibility of using it to my advantage. The four of us drove through turns 4, 5, 6 & 7 all jockeying for position. Then at the exit to turn 7, with an SP911 pass being made, I saw

my window of opportunity (the Gap!), and between cars, made a successful pass of my competitor. Wow, that felt good. But one of the SP911's was still behind me entering the octopus turn. Part way through the turn, I had one SP911 on my right and the other on my tail and I'm hustling the turn best as I can. I felt like a Top Gun fighter pilot with bogies all around.

Looking back now I can imagine Goose yelling there's one right and one behind and Maverick yelling I got 'em, I got 'em. Then suddenly back to reality when my back-end begins to slide and in no time, I'm in a full spin. Everyone evades, including the competitor I just passed. Damn! It takes me about 45 seconds to restart, watching the field pass by. I decided to continue with the final two laps and finished in last place. I did not want a DNF. Lesson learned—keep focused on your goals, don't get distracted with other people or competitors who are not important to your objective.


These were just three events in an otherwise successful race weekend with countless passes made by me and others. Over the years I've competed in about 50 races. 99% of the time the Gap dance between drivers and cars is uneventful and executed with grace and respect. Yes, racing does carry serious risk of damage and injury. But the battle of man and machine will continue forever. It really is quite amazing that we can all get along so well most of the time. Wouldn't it be nice if the rest of the country and world could do the same?

Paul Devany on the track at the NJMP PCA club race





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


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

While every Porsche is special, some tend to be a bit more so. For the 993, the Turbo (and Turbo S) were the ultimate expressions of the air-cooled, road-going 911, delivering blistering acceleration on a level that is impressive even by today's standards. 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
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
