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

Well, here we have it. another successful summer event. The Midst of Summer Autocross was attended forty-three drivers by and they were rewarded with good weather for the duration of the event. Once again Rich Wayne set a masterful course which was challenging enough for the veteran autocrossers but also easy enough for the beginners. Many new PCAR drivers are showing up and

for this event twenty-seven of the forty-three cars were Porsches. I love to see this, so please keep on coming out and seeing what your car can do. We were treated to a nice surprise as the Nassau Coliseum swept the lot for us, so the usual pebbles and silt were minimal. The lot was looking the best it looked in a long time which made for a better event than usual.

And now for the results:

To start off the results, Sean M took the win in S2 with a time of 48.098 seconds. Corrine L took the win in S4 with a time of 49.925 seconds. Four driver S5 found Thomas P in the first place spot with the time of 45.411 seconds to beat out Louise A, who drove the course in 48.295 seconds and Manny G who drove the course in 49.991 seconds for the 2nd and 3rd place spots, respectively. S6, with three drivers, found Mitch H in first place with a 46.220 second run to beat out second place JoAnne F who drove the course in 47.235 seconds. Keep it up Joanne, you'll beat him soon. S9 with one driver found Farhan B in first place with a time of 44.177 seconds.

Now off to our production classes. Michael K took the win in P3, with three drivers, with a time of 43.9 seconds to beat out Jon R who drove the course in 49.401 seconds. Michael's time was good enough to earn him the Fastest Pax of the Day award. P4 found Dominick T in first place with a time of 47.860 seconds and P5 found Richard W in first place with a time of 43.255 seconds. P6, with four drivers, was dominated by Michael C who drove the course in 43.391 seconds to beat out yours truly who drove the course in 44.053 seconds. Mark H took the third place spot with a time of 44.072 seconds. P7 was dominated by Vaino N with a 44.136 second run around the lot and Henry H took the 1st place spot and P9 with

a time of 42.121 seconds. This was good enough to earn Henry the Fastest Time of the Day. Congratulations.

In our Improved class, with three drivers, Ben O took the win with a time of 42.629 seconds and in our Modified class, Tim M took the win with a time of 42.321 seconds. And now for non-Porsche classes. X1, with three drivers, found Elliott W in the first place spot with a 44.068 second run to beat out Bryan J who took a second place spot with a time of 44.972 seconds in his hairdresser's Miata. X2, with eight drivers, found SCCA autocross chair Brian W in the 1st place spot with a time of 42.640 seconds, Anthony C took second place with a time of 42.867 seconds and Christian H took the third place spot with a time of 43.318 seconds. X3, with six drivers found Jonathan W in the 1st place spot with a 43.004 second run which beat out Demetrius S's time of 43.994 seconds. Don H took the third place spot with a time of 46.458 seconds.

That's all for this event. Remember our September 7 event was cancelled. So, our next events will be back at Tobay Beach on October 20th, 27th and November 17th. Looking forward to seeing you all out there.




If you are like me, then you like good food. In the past, we have tried food trucks, grab and go sandwiches and the like. Frankly, those just never seem to work well and, as

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Track Ramblings FRED PACK - DE INSTRUCTOR

MY JOURNEY

As a kid, I had no interest in cars at all. My father made me wash his car, which made me even less interested in cars, and he often told me that I hadn't washed it properly, which really turned me off to cars. Then he bought a Jaguar, but not the gorgeous XK-E; rather it was the Mark 10 sedan. I was always a techy-type and used to marvel at its engine

- all shiny with double overhead camshafts and 3 SU carburetors. Then I went away to boarding school. The boys there were always talking about the Lime Rock track which was only about 3 miles from the school. I had a look and my life changed. I saw gorgeous Ferraris and Porsches, and they were much more interesting than ancient Greece and learning French. The 904 was breathtaking. I devoured Road & Track and Car & Driver. I became friendly with John Fitch, a renowned racer who lived on the Lime Rock property - he was a WW2 fighter ace who became a racer in the early 50s - Sebring, Le Mans, that sort of thing. He invited me to join him at the 1965 Sebring where he drove a 904 GTS. The race coincided with spring break, so I went. I was in the factory Porsche pits for the race. As you can imagine, I had the time of my life.

I spent the summer of 1966 in Europe with a college friend. We attended 3 Grand Prix races and drove the Nürburgring and Monza. I met Jimmy Clark, Graham Hill, and Colin Chapman. In a future column, I may tell the story of how I "drove" Clark's F1 car at the 'Ring. Later, I bought a used 1967 Alfa Romeo GTV. It was gorgeous and had 108hp, dual overhead cams, a 5-speed gearbox and disc brakes. Wow! After a few years of exposure to its unreliability, I got a 1973 Datsun 510 and I started going to 'track days' at Lime Rock. There was no such thing as organized HPDE in those days, at least in the events I went to. There were no instructors or classroom sessions — you had to figure it all out by yourself. Tech inspection? What's that?

Married life and work got in the way, and I stopped doing track events for years, but then a truly life-changing thing

happened: The Porsche 944 happened. The trouble was that it cost about \$25,000, which was a lot for me. But it was so beautiful and it had 145hp, so I bought one and joined PCA in 1984. I started going to Lime Rock a lot and found that PCA HPDE was very different from 1970s-style track days. I had to get the car 'teched' before each event, also had to attend classroom sessions, and always had an instructor on board with me. A few years later I got a 1989 944S2 with dual overhead cams, 208hp, and greatly improved brakes, as well as ABS. I added Bridgehampton, Watkins Glen, and Summit Point to the tracks I attended. I was absolutely hooked on Porsche and the PCA DE program. I remember being in the Green (beginner) group for what seemed to be an eternity, but ultimately did pass through Blue and White to Black and became an instructor in 1995.

Around 2000, I decided to get a real track car and added a 1973 Porsche 914 to my garage. It only had 94hp but it was mid-engined with a 5-speed gearbox and it weighed 2000 lbs. I upgraded the suspension and wheels/tires, installed a full cage and track seats/belts. It didn't have much acceleration, but it sure could corner, and you rarely used the brakes. Then my friend sold me his '84 911, so that was the end of the 914. The 911 had 200hp. I changed out the suspension and installed a full cage and was "off to the races" again.

I fell in love with the Boxster as soon as it was introduced. I had a '98 (200hp) and followed it with a 2000 Boxster S (250hp). I loved that car but when I started reading about the forthcoming 2004 GT3, I just had to have one. 380hp!!! I changed out the suspension, installed a half-cage and track seats/belts and expanded my track horizons by going to VIR and Mid-Ohio a few times. NJMP opened in 2008 which was very convenient for me. The Boxster bug bit me again so I got a 2011 Boxster S (330hp, with substantial electronic aids which made it safer on the track). After a few years, I did an engine swap and installed a 911 GTS 408hp engine into it. Most unfortunately in 2019, I had a crash at NJMP and it was wrecked. My current P-car is a '21 Boxster GTS (394hp) which is completely stock but it sure is at home on the track and quite pleasant on the street.

Teams will follow a set of instructions directing them on a route turn-by-turn. Each team will try to travel at specific speeds (never above speed limits) and maintain them as they follow the route. The more accurately you can drive at the given speeds the better you will do. The actual time you should pass unannounced "checkpoints" is recorded using a smartphone APP. I will give more detailed information in next month's Post.

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

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Driver's Education BRANDON TASSO - DE CHAIR



Green, Yellow, Blue, White, Black & Red... Much like in Jiu Jitsu (in which I earned my brown belt), these are the different colors/ranks a driver can achieve within Metro NY's DE program, but what do they mean? This information has been extracted from Metro NY PCA's IDP (Instructor Development Program) manual.

Green: You're a beginner on the track. You always have an instructor with you, explaining everything you need to know; showing you where the flag stations are, reminding you what the flags mean and where the driving line is. Your instructor will stress safety as well as smooth inputs of steering, throttle and brake.

Yellow: • Demonstrates understanding and adherence to MNY PCA HPDE Safety ethos. • Exhibits good track etiquette and consideration for other drivers. • Drives the line accurately and consistently. • Is predictable on track. • Drives at an appropriate pace for the group. • Inputs increasingly smooth. • Makes few mistakes and can self-correct. • Stays calm in traffic. • Anticipates slower cars in front. Reacts accordingly. • Does not follow too closely. • Communicates well with instructors. • Does not give or accept late passing signals. • Gives passing signals promptly and visibly. One signal per car. • Passes with good safety margins. • Displays full knowledge of procedures, flags, marshal stand locations, and driving terminology. • Student is safe to drive alone in Yellow Group.

Blue: • Willing to be promoted to Solo (no instructor in the car). • Demonstrates full understanding and compliance with Metro New York DE philosophy. • Knows the line and is consistent and predictable. • The student has developed very smooth inputs, especially under braking. • Uses good vision especially in corners with eyes up. • Has 360° situational awareness. • Looks through corners, developing "Big Vision". • Carries reasonable momentum into corners. • Drives at a speed consistent with the group or higher. • Practices effective "Heel-and-Toe" down-shifting – for manual gearbox cars. • Demonstrates

competent car control and recovery skills. • Is fully aware of all flag meanings and procedures automatically. • Gives visible, prompt, and courteous passing signals. • Good driving record for a minimum of two events. • Calmly deals with fast traffic and close passing. • Begins to demonstrate "Trail braking" • Practices accelerating from the apex of a turn through track-out • Can talk instructor fully through a lap. • Can competently drive offline. • Knows and can use "rain line." • Can drive safely and correctly without instructor input.


White: • Desire to be promoted to White. • 360° situational awareness. • Displays a courteous, respectful attitude, without intimidation or aggression. • Does not overdrive. Demonstrates safe, consistent decision-making. • Requests continued instruction and demonstrates ongoing improvement. • Drives the line flawlessly and effortlessly. · Very smooth inputs at all speeds. · Demonstrates good brake release. . Correctly uses trail braking, throttle steer, heel-and-toe. • Uses appropriate vision techniques for higher speed throughout track. • Expected to carry considerable momentum through corners. • Can safely vary the line in any corner (to avoid debris for example). Calmly deals with cars in close proximity.
 Drives at a pace appropriate to group and approaching car limits. · Can demonstrate the "rain line" and understand the concepts of that line . Can demonstrate unconscious competence through multiple laps - ideally a session - for instance by holding a discussion with instructor unrelated to the driving.

Black: Desire to be promoted to Black. Always drives without aggression, respectful and courteous to others. • Provide very smooth inputs at all speeds. • Demonstrates expert vision skills by looking well ahead. Continuously scans down-track for points of emerging information. • Uses brakes minimally but wisely. • Understands and carries considerable momentum through corners. • Has mastered trail braking, throttle steer, and heel-and-toe. • Can easily handle closeness of other cars without losing focus. • Drives at a pace appropriate for the run group and approaching the situationally safe limits of their car. Balances car flawlessly.
 Can describe and show their limits without leaving track. • Can fully describe their actions on track and their reasons for them. . Shows consistent unconscious competence while driving as outlined above. • Constantly pursues improvement on track.

A Look into The Diagnostic Process

You are out for a drive on a Sunday with a group of friends and after the first rest stop, you jump back in your beloved Porsche, fire it up and it happens. The dreaded check engine light! Best case scenario, you drive the rest of the day if it isn't running poorly but it still puts a damper on things not knowing what is going on. Worst case you are left waiting for a flatbed and a ride home. Fast forward to the next morning and you make a call to your local shop of choice to get it in for diagnostics. What happens next? What is our process behind the scenes to get the issue figured out and sorted? That's a moving target generally but I wanted to write a short blurb to both shed some light on how we as repair shops "do what we do" and highlight some nuance to diagnostics we often have to overcome.

First things first, we need to verify the complaint. You will often get a call from your advisor looking for more information. When did it occur? How warm was it outside? Did you just fill up the fuel tank and so on. This is important as having more information is better for all parties involved. My personal favorite type of issue to the dismay of many owners is the one that the car comes in on a flatbed. Those are generally having issues that you have no problem recreating. That's not to say a car can't get towed in and be perfectly fine when it gets there but for the sake of this example let's say it is a hard fault. A hard fault, happens all the time, easy to duplicate concerns will 90% of the time be the easier thing to sort and fix. What gets hard is the "only happens on track after 5 laps", "has happened to me twice this year" etc. At that point, we are testing systems and components that will likely be fine because the conditions aren't right. That's where the gathering of information above comes in so we can do our best to put the car in the same conditions. Give as much info as you can, no one will ever complain about having more rather than less information.

We've done it! The concern is duplicated, the fault has come back or system affected is in its fault state. There is now a clear problem to get to the bottom of. This is where the team will gather information on our side to start doing the actual diagnosis. A lot of the time it will be through the use of fault codes stored in the affected system and using the diagnostic steps associated with those faults to drill down to the root cause. This may include but is certainly not limited to wiring checks, control unit/component self-checks and in some cases the use of known good components. The steps needed often change but are always all required to ensure you are targeting the cause and not the effect. For example, you have a code for a cooling system malfunction on a 991.2. That can point to

a number of components in that system that all need to be working in unison for the system to be operational. There is a mechanical, an electrical, and a vacuum side of that system so how do you know where to start? For most of us, especially at specialty shops and dealerships alike, we have seen this before. So, we start where we think the issue will most likely be found. The vacuum solenoids on these cars have a habit of failing and Porsche has even released a revision over the years for an updated/better part. Does that mean we just throw a few solenoids at it and see what happens? Absolutely not! We need to test each of the 3 sides of that system and determine what is not doing its job. Do we have sufficient vacuum, do the solenoids actuate when commanded, is the shroud on the water pump working when vacuum is applied?

A year or so ago we dealt with this exact issue, we determined the vacuum supply to be insufficient and through process of elimination by isolating each leg of the vacuum system found a faulty exhaust changeover flap that was leaking enough to deplete the vacuum system below a working threshold for the cooling system components. Did we start looking at the issue assuming we would likely end up with a solenoid to change? Yes, however, the diagnostic process allowed us to find the root cause and not repair the effect or the easy answer. It generally takes more time up front and that can be a struggle when you are left at home wondering what is going on with your car but in the end, you will have a better outcome rather than getting a car back that is not fixed right the first time.

Now that we know our issue we can finally contact you and let you know what we have found, an estimate for the repairs, and most importantly, a timeline to get it fixed. That is not quite the end of it however. When parts arrive and have been installed, it is always best practice to repeat the diagnostic steps used when finding the issue to check our work and make sure the vehicle is operating to its original specifications. This can be supplemented as well with running internal tests within the DME to ensure all systems are once again in unison. Thankfully, all the leg work up front should allow us to do this verification rather quickly. From there, you should be back to your Sunday drives with a happy and healthy machine poised to deliver the joys and smiles we as enthusiasts enjoy oh so much!

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Porsche Market Update

July's market couldn't have been different than the last few months as we hit our lowest sell-through rate of the year despite having the highest unit volume thus far. A total of 616 Porsches crossed the block with only 66% of them selling for a total of \$30,539,719. The other notable difference was at the top of the market

where we didn't have our usual hypercar mix, but instead, a number of vintage and modern classics that failed to sell despite some pretty strong bids.

At the top of that mix was a 1991 911 Targa by Singer. Delivered in May 2023, the "Niseko Commission" was reimagined in Onyx Green Metallic over a Light Gray leather interior with Torre del Lago Nubuck accents. The car was equipped with the 4.0-liter Ed Pink-built engine, which is usually what it takes to push a Singer over the \$1m mark these days. But even though this example did cross the million-dollar mark at a final bid of \$1,005,000, it went unsold.

Other notable vintage cars that failed to sell at the top of the market were a pair of special 356s brought to market as part of the Gruppe-P Collection on Bring a Trailer. The 1961 356B Super 90 GT from the collection failed to sell at a final bid of \$730,000. But the one that surprised me was the 1959 356A 1600 Carrera GS Coupe that failed to sell at \$802,000, the highest bid we've seen in the past five years for a Coupe and almost Carrera Speedster money.

And it wasn't just the top of the 356 market that struggled this month either as only 52% of the 23 examples on offer found new homes. Taking top honors was a 1953 356 Pre-A Coupe finished in Azure Blue over Tan that sold at a final bid of \$185,000, \$24,000 more than what it brought in 2020.

On the newer end of the market, we saw our first 2024 718 Spyder RS sell at a final bid of \$256,000, which is

about \$59,000 over its original MSRP. What's interesting about this sale is that it was higher than any GT4 RS had sold for up until this month, where we saw a new high of \$274,999. It makes you wonder if Porsche announcing the end of combustion 718 production had an effect on prices.

If you look at the entire 718 market, it has been fairly flat over the last twelve months with both manual and PDK-equipped GT4s softening over the last few months. Boxster Spyders have remained flat but the most recent sale of a 756-mile 2023 example finished in PTS Racing Green Metallic seemed to buck that trend bringing \$151,000. The 718 market will definitely be interesting to watch as we roll into August.

Speaking of August, Monterey Car Week auctions kick off on the 14th with Broad Arrow's Monterey Jet Center sale followed by sales from Mecum, Bonhams, RM Sotheby's, and Gooding & Company. There are some amazing Porsches on offer including a super rare 911 GT1, a Singer DLS, a pair of 550 Spyders, and plenty of other amazing cars. Watch these pages next month for what I hope is a record month.

RED/Instructor: Progression from Black towards Red occurs when a Black run group driver enters the IDP. The driver is labeled a Black Instructor or IDP Candidate until they have graduated from the IDP, successfully completed PCA National Instructor Training and been assigned a PCA National Instructor number. Black Instructors and Red Instructors may both run on track in

the Red run group. It is expected that any driver promoted into the MNY PCA Black run group has the driving skills to become an instructor .

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




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

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


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
