


The month of May was a very busy period for Metro. Not only did Autocross resume (at the Nassau Coliseum), but we had two DE events, as well as several social events. The month concluded with the Pindar Rally and Concours in Peconic, Long Island.

I also took a long driving trip to North Carolina and Tennessee in mid-May to take on the Tail of the

Dragon with its 318 turns in only 11 miles. I compare it to a 20-minute autocross track. Combined with the Cherohala Skyway and the Back of the Dragon, it was a week of the most hectic driving one can do, all in the Appalachian Mountains. Most of us are hit with the desire to really push the car, and these roads provide the pavement to do so. All of us can appreciate the skills built from Autocross and Driver's Education, so we can be better drivers, and we appreciate the complex physics that we must understand to drive the car competently. I took my 718 Cayman on this trip, accompanied by a handful of Metro members who appreciate the challenge. It is a "bucket list" trip for Porsche drivers.

What made this trip so much fun is always the cama-

raderie and the shared experience of road vs. machine (and not hitting a deer or a bear). Driving 2300 miles in 7 days can create a sense of adventure (not so bad in sport seats) and the frequent "thumbs up", honks, and parking lot conversations from locals interested in a group of Porsches with New York license plates. This is why we drive these cars, as each turn of the key is the start of a new adventure. I love to watch the reaction of adjacent cars when the wing raises, or when I let people pass me on the highway, and they realize that I am having too much fun to care that they want to drive faster than me. We own these cars because they indulge our sense of freedom and excitement, even when they are sitting in the driveway.

This issue of the Post celebrates the true Porsche experience, on the backroad, on the highway, on the track, or even on one of New York City's cobblestone streets. Metro has the distinction of having the broadest driving environments in PCA, from ocean beaches to mountains, from downtown to country, and from our driveway to the track. We are working to provide more photography to highlight our hobby (did I say obsession?) and the need to wipe, clean, buff, polish, and detail until our fingers bleed. The open road is calling, and hopefully, this issue will inspire you to get behind the wheel.

transition to the Nassau Coliseum was successful. Forty drivers showed up for the "Good Weather Autocross" as the title doesn't suggest. the weather was just ok. It started out better than it ended as it was very windy all day but for the most part we had some sun. It ended windier and cloudier than I would have liked, however, it could have been worse.

Rich Wayne designed the course, and it was tricky. Partially due to the undulating canvas he must work with and partially because of the driving elements. It was loads of fun with multiple driving lines. The challenge was to find the fastest one for your car. What a blast!! Here are the results.

In the s2 class, Corinne L. had the class to herself but still put down a respectable time of 52.255 in her 2001 Boxster. The s3 category saw Mitch H. outpace Saverio M., clocking in at 50.434 in his 2006 Cayman S. Saverio followed with a 52.552, securing second. Over in s6, Steven B. topped the class in his 2013 Boxster S with a 53.967, just ahead of Tom A. in his 2023 911 Targa 4S, who finished at 55.572. The s9 class featured a solo run by Kayla A. in a 2025 Cayenne, finishing with a time of 62.544.

Vintage machinery made a showing in p1, where Colby D. piloted his 1976 912e to a best time of 61.321. In p2, Andre C. took first place with a sharp 48.784 in his 1995 968, edging out Dominick T., who drove his 1989 928 to a 49.798. The p3 class was closely contested by Rich and Ryan W., both driving 2000 Boxsters. Richard narrowly took the win with a 46.374, with Ryan close behind at 46.664. Rich's time was good enough to earn him the Fastest Time of the Day and the Fastest Pax of the Day spots. Congratulations Rich! Nick I. rounded out the podium with a 48.770 in his 2007 Cayman.

The p4 class had a tight battle at the top. Dan F. and his 2006 Cayman S secured the class win with a time of 48.198, narrowly ahead of Anthony H's 48.243 in a 2001 C2. Louie A. claimed third with a 49.825, while Jack M. came in fourth. In p6, Ben O. posted one of the fastest times of the day—46.826 in a 2018 911 GT3—followed

by Michael C. in a 2023 GT4 with 47.723, and Farhan B. in another GT3 at 48.893.

The improved class saw Joshua O. dominate in a 2016 GT4, finishing with 48.148, ahead of Tom P's 52.212. In the competitive x1 class, Graham M. piloted a 1990 Viper JR to victory with a 49.592, just ahead of Nolan M. and Bryan J., who logged 50.025 and 50.271, respectively. The largest class, x2, was led by Christopher T. in a 2002 M3 with a solid 48.231, followed by Matisse E. in a 2004 RX8 at 49.579, and Sean M. in a 2025 Integra Type S at 50.113.

Finally, the x3 class saw one of the more commanding wins of the day. Timothy B. ran a quick 47.460 in his 2023 WRX, well ahead of JT M. in a 2019 Mustang with 50.760 and Howayne D., who clocked 52.309 in a 1999 911. With a mix of seasoned veterans and fresh faces, this year's Good Weather Autocross delivered exciting battles and impressive performances across every class.

That's it for our first Nassau Coliseum Event. Our next event will be on June 8, also at the Nassau Coliseum. Some exciting upcoming events to look forward to. On July 27th, we will be taking it on the road and autocrossing with three other PCA regions at Pocono Raceway. I will be blocking off a bunch of rooms for those who want to stay over. We will be going out for a nice dinner on Saturday night before the race. The rooms will be available Saturday and Sunday night for those who want to stay over after the event. Pocono is a great autocross site and promises a high-speed, challenging course.

This would be a great warmup/practice for the Zone 1 Autocross, which will be held at the usual Ft. Devens Air Base in Ayer, Massachusetts. The dates will be August 23 and 24th. This is a two-day event with a different course each day. It is social as well and loads of fun. We get dinner on Friday night, and there will be a catered BBQ on Saturday night. This is also a shirt year, so all participants will receive a Zone 1 Autocross Shirt. This only happens every five years. Don't miss out on this fashionable extra! On another note, this will be the last year that Zone 1 will be putting on this event. Next year and going forward, the Metro NY Region will host the Zone 1 Autocross. Stay tuned for bigger and better things.

Our first Tour / Trek of the season took place on Sunday, June 8th, ending at the Malcolm Pray Achievement Center in Bedford, NY. I will report on Trek 1 in the July issue of the Post.

The meeting point for all five Treks this year will start from the same location as last year. Kingsbrook Office Park, Building 4, 1100 King

Street, Rye Brook, NY.

The Second Tour / Trek will be 97.2 miles long. We will be straddling the roads along the NY and CT border for the first leg of the Trek, then making our way to the midway rest stop at Rosy Tomorrow's in Danbury. The entire second leg of the Trek will be winding through Upper Fairfield County, CT. We will be ending the Trek at The Cue BBQ Joint in Danbury, CT, for a sit-down BBQ-style luncheon.

TREK REGISTRATION

The registration process starts by going to the website clubregistration.net. I suggest that all members who are not familiar with Club Registration and do not have an account set up already visit their website at clubregistration.net/login and create an account. This will make the registration process a lot smoother when you are ready to register for the Trek or any other Metro PCA events. I will be giving detailed email instructions in the near future on how to register for a Driver and how to register for a passenger. Each person attending the event must be registered and paid for separately.

When searching for the Trek events to register for, start with searching by event host, which is Metro NY PCA, then also include the other search box by event type, which is Tours. Then hit search. This will take you to the location to register for the event.

REGISTRATION FOR TREK #2 July 13th 2025 WILL OPEN ON MONDAY, JUNE 16TH, AT 7 PM AND WILL CLOSE ON MONDAY, JUNE 23rd, AT 7 PM.



Track Ramblings

CONSISTENCY

The key word, as I interpret it, is "foolish" meaning that you have a little mind if you insist on holding a foolish opinion in spite of the actual facts and circumstances. He wrote those words in 1851, so he certainly wasn't thinking about track driving. But a non-foolish consistency is not a hobgoblin at all: It is the mark of goodness.

You may be wondering what this has to do with the art of track driving. The answer is that consistency is an absolute requirement for both good laptimes and safety. It is essential that you determine the correct line for each turn on the course and establish your braking, cornering (the 3 key locations – turn-in, apex and track-out) and accelerating points for each and every corner. Otherwise, each lap you drive becomes an exploration into the unknown, rather than a quest for excellence. The reason F1 drivers are able to run laps which are within a few tenths of seconds of each other is that they drive the car the identical, consistent way on each lap.

Long ago, as a teenager, I had press credentials to the Dutch Grand Prix at Zandvoort which allowed me access to the track during the race. I stood at the apex of the Tarzan Curve and trackout point of the Hugenholtz hairpin taking photos with my Pentax. The drivers navigated with surgical precision, hitting their marks with a consistency of inches. (As an aside, I cannot recommend that you duplicate my conduct. I could very easily have gotten killed. The famous racing photographer Bernard Cahier poked fun at me when I would flinch as the Grand Prix cars would come literally within inches of us. He stood perfectly calm and collected.)

Notice something important: the period before the race when the drivers are trying out their cars on the track is called "practice". Similarly, when musicians are working on their material, they are "practicing". To attain perfection is beyond our human abilities. It is consistent practice towards consistency that lets us approach it.

As I write this, I am just back from Watkins Glen. On

one lap as I approached the apex of Turn 1, I saw a car ahead of me go slightly off the track at corner exit into the runoff area. The driver freaked and pulled the car back onto the track by yanking the steering wheel to the right. This caused a massive oversteer condition and the car shot across the track pointing backwards (!!), then crashed into the guardrails on the right (inside) of the track. Fortunately, he was not injured.

I mention this incident because it is important for drivers who go off the racing surface to utilize the runoff space that most turns have, rather than to try to pull their car back onto the track. Just look at the right side of the exit of NJMP Lightning's Turn 1 and you'll see silent testimony about all the drivers who didn't utilize the runoff area. Please file this tidbit into your knowledge banks.

Last month I discussed my own demon: the anxiety of being fully on the gas pedal as the turn approaches, so I coast for a moment or two before applying the brakes. I have to say that I did make some progress, but not enough. I seem to need a moment of coasting into the turns in spite of my efforts to defeat this habit. I'll continue to work on it and keep you posted on my progress.



As always, the Clubregistration website will dictate dates and cost to attend these events.





The Addictive Joy of HPDE: Why You Should Get on Track Yesterday By someone who's totally not addicted... okay, maybe a little.

There's a moment—right after turn-in, mid-corner, tires singing, throttle feathered—where the world goes silent. Everything else falls away. That looming work deadline? Gone. That group text arguing about

next week? Erased from memory. In that moment, it's just you, your car, and the track.

Welcome to the glorious rabbit hole that is HPDE, or High-Performance Driver Education. If you've ever stared wistfully at twisty roads or fantasized about being the next Lewis Hamilton during your morning commute, HPDE is your ticket to real speed, real learning, and real adrenaline... all without the real danger (or legal repercussions) of spirited backroad "testing."

What Is HPDE, Anyway?

At its core, HPDE is a non-competitive track driving event where drivers of all skill levels can safely explore the limits of their cars—and themselves—under the guidance of experienced instructors. You don't need to be a racecar driver. You don't need a racecar. Heck, you don't even need to know how to heel-toe shift (yet). All you need is a properly maintained car and a willingness to learn. It's like driver's ed... but instead of a sweaty instructor yelling at you in a beige Camry, you're on a race track with a coach helping you master apexes and brake zones. Sound fun yet? It is. It really, really is.

Your Car, Reimagined

You may think you know your car. But the moment you take it on track, your relationship changes. That corner you used to take at 30 mph on the way to Starbucks was child's play. On track, you discover how your tires communicate with the pavement, how your brakes feel at 10/10ths, and just how precise your steering can be. Even a bone-stock Civic or Miata becomes a scalpel in the right hands. (And let's not get started on Caymans or M3s—they come alive like caffeinated cats.)

Every HPDE session is a conversation between you and your machine. One lap, you overbrake. The next, you nail it. Then you're early on the throttle and get a little wiggle. You adjust. You improve. It's a beautiful dance of physics and focus—and the car is your partner.

The People: Track Rats and Instant Friends

Think you'll be surrounded by ultra-competitive, Type-A lunatics with \$200k builds and carbon fiber everything? Nah. HPDE paddocks are filled with friendly, curious, slightly obsessive people who just want to talk about tire temps, brake pads, and how to shave tenths off Turn 7. Whether you're driving a Corolla or a GT4, everyone's welcome. You'll find instructors who remember their first track day like it was yesterday and are more than happy to help you learn. You'll find track-day veterans offering you tools, suspension setup tips, and a cold drink—all in the same sentence. It's a family. A fast, loud, tiresmelling family.

Learning Never Ends

HPDE isn't a one-and-done experience. It's a journey. You start in the beginner group, with an instructor riding shotgun, guiding you through lines, braking points, and proper etiquette. Before long, you're soloing, moving up to intermediate, then advanced—each level unlocking a new depth of car control and speed.

The joy isn't just in going fast—it's in mastering something. You'll start to feel the track, anticipate its rhythm, and eventually, you're linking corners like a symphony. It's both humbling and empowering. Every mistake is a lesson. Every clean lap is a victory. And when you finally nail that one corner that's been taunting you all weekend, you'll be smiling for days!

Run groups are based on skill, passing is only in designated zones with point-bys, and instructors (especially in the early stages) help keep everything cool, calm, and controlled. Unlike racing, there's no checkered flag to chase. No trophies, no podiums. Winning DE is taking you and your car home in one piece.


Warning: It's Addictive

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
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Tech Review and Update

CHRIS MANFREDI - TECH CHAIR



Dissimilar Materials

I want to share a few thoughts on dissimilar materials and explore some of the techniques I've used to meet some of the challenges posed by their use in an automotive setting.

The use of dissimilar metals can pose several problems for car owners and people who service them. When dissimilar

metals are attached, it creates an environment in which galvanic corrosion can occur. This electrochemical process often weakens the materials and makes their removal difficult. Corrosion between alloy wheels found on your Porsche and the steel hubs to which they mount often causes problems in their removal. When this happens, I will loosely install a wheel fastener or two and tap the wheel from the inside with a plastic dead-blow hammer. This is usually enough to free the wheel. If this doesn't work, soaking with a penetrant, applying heat, or the use of a puller could be employed. I recommend that these latter options be entrusted to a professional to minimize damage. After the wheel is successfully removed, thoroughly clean the mating surfaces between the wheel and the hub with a wire brush or a Scotch-brite pad, lube with your favorite penetrating oil, and lightly coat with an anti-seize lubricant. This should make future removal easier.

Broken studs and bolts are often cause for concern, but employing a few techniques can make their removal easier. As always, apply a penetrating oil and heat as appropriate. It's important to heat the surrounding material and not the fastener itself. Care must be used when dealing with soft alloys, especially magnesium, as it can ignite.

Before breaking a seized metal fastener, consider cutting its head off. This will often give you more material to work with. I've collected several specialized stud removal tools over the years, but I rarely use them. Recently, I experienced the 'Perfect Storm' of dissimilar metals wherein cast aluminum was bolted to cast iron with a steel bolt and left to corrode since 1972. All the bolts snapped at the slightest application of a wrench. Thankfully, just

heads snapped off, leaving me more material to work with. In this instance, I successfully welded a new nut to the remaining shank of the bolt, soaked it in penetrating oil, and heated the surrounding casting with a torch. They were easily removed with no damage to the treads.

If a fastener breaks at or below the surface, other techniques may be employed. First, you need to drill a hole in the center of the broken fastener. It's important to position the hole in the center. There are tools available to help you accomplish this. You can try one of the several extractor tools available to try to grab the broken fastener. The most common ones are tapered. I don't recommend these. I've found that as they wedge themselves into the hole, they tend to expand the broken fastener, making it even more stubborn. I prefer the two-piece design — they are straight, not tapered, and are less likely to expand the fastener. I sourced a kit that includes the drills and the pilot tool. My preferred method is to drill the hole deadcenter and progressively enlarge the hole one drill size until all that remains is the sliver of threads that are easily removed with no damage. You can also use left-hand drill bits. These tend to remove the fastener when they catch. Dissimilar materials present other problems, and it's helpful to understand why. Different materials expand and contract at different rates. This is often the reason why radiators and gaskets fail. Modern radiators are typically constructed with plastic tanks and an alloy core. When heated, these two materials expand and contract at different rates. There is a seal between the core and the tanks that will eventually fail, in part, due to the movement between the dissimilar materials. Similarly, when a gasket is positioned between two dissimilar materials, the gasket often fails after countless heat cycles.

On our older 911s, head studs were a common failure; they either broke or pulled out of the case. This is due, in part, to different expansion rates between the engine alloys and the steel studs. Dilavar studs were later employed. They are both stronger than the originals and more closely match the expansion rates of the surrounding alloys. When it comes to cleaning corroded parts, I highly recommend a product called 'Evapo-Rust'. If you haven't already, try it.

Porsche Market Update

April 2025 marked a high point in the modern Porsche auction market, driven in large part by Broad Arrow's AirlWater sale in Costa Mesa. With 664 Porsches sold across all major platforms, the month delivered \$56,730,704 in total sales—a slight dip from March's figure, but still the third highest dollar volume in the past

three years. The 76% sell-through rate was the strongest since March 2023, signaling renewed momentum as we move deeper into the spring selling season.

In its second year, Air|Water posted a solid showing. Of the 55 cars on offer, 58% hammered sold for a total of \$14,288,900. While the conversion rate dipped slightly versus 2024, total sales volume increased, suggesting a consistent base of engaged buyers. As of this writing, several post-auction deals have already closed—including the Carrera GT and a yellow 356C Coupe—though for consistency, those results aren't included in sell-through rate or dollar volume.

Among the standout results was the Zagato-bodied 356B 'Sanction Lost,' one of the most visually striking cars of the weekend. It exceeded its \$375,000 high estimate to sell for \$445,000 all-in, and was as captivating in person as any 356 I've seen at auction.

On the high end, the RUF CTR 'Yellowbird' drew plenty of attention and ultimately sold toward the lower end of its range at \$4,680,000. With 23,000 miles on the clock, that result was in line with expectations—especially in the wake of last month's \$6M sale of a sub-1,000-mile example.

There were still deals to be had. A 2002 Boxster S 6-speed brought just \$9,520 all-in—\$5,000 below its low estimate, and an absolute steal for a clean, affordable driver. Meanwhile, a 1977 911S Coupe in Paint-to-Sample Metallic Black with tasteful upgrades sold for \$47,600, easily \$10k under comparable examples.

The transaxle segment got a boost from a strong result on a 1981 928 5-speed. Finished in Grand Prix White over Black, with a documented ownership history and a rebuilt engine, it sold for \$63,840—well above the model's \$25,000 twelve-month average. A prime example of spec, service, and presentation coming together.

Finally, it was encouraging to see another vintage race car find a new home. A largely unrestored 1966 906, complete with its original gearbox and Type 910 flat-six, sold for \$1,528,500. That result fell just short of estimate, but made it two consecutive months with major race car sales—a promising sign for the long-stagnant motorsport segment.

While Air|Water headlined the month's live auctions, it was the online platforms that quietly delivered the stronger overall performance. Higher sell-through rates and a steady stream of mid-market successes gave digital venues the edge-but not every segment shared in that momentum. The 356 market, in particular, lagged behind. April's online 356 sell-through rate came in at 65%, a noticeable drop from March's 71%, and several high-profile listings failed to meet reserve. Chief among them was a 1965 356 Emory Special Cabriolet that had previously sold for \$755,000—the second-highest result ever for an Emory build. This time around, it stalled at a high bid of \$651,000. Finished in Tropical Green Metallic over Vine Green leather and powered by a 2.6-liter Emory-Rothsport flat-four, it featured the hallmarks of Rod Emory's signature craftsmanship-but even that wasn't enough to close the deal, suggesting some fatigue at the upper end of the segment.

All told, April delivered a strong showing across the Porsche auction landscape, with the highest sell-through rate in over a year and sustained momentum in both live and online channels. While Broad Arrow's Air|Water sale brought energy and headline results, much of the month's consistency came from online platforms steadily moving well-presented, mid-market cars. Segments like transaxles continued their quiet climb, while a few outliers—particularly among 356s—faced more scrutiny. Still, the overall tone remains positive: buyers are active, selective, and willing to pay for the right car at the right price. If April is any indication, 2025's spring season is just hitting its stride.







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While every Porsche is special, some tend to be a bit more so. For the 993, the Turbo/Turbo S were the ultimate expressions of the air-cooled, road-going 911, delivering blistering acceleration on a level that is impressive even by today's standards. Our client's pristine Turbo on the left is a stunner, finished in PTS Turquoise Metallic.

The folks at RUF took the 993 even further, first with their Turbo R then, nearly two decades later, the Turbo R Limited (the green example on the right is one of only seven produced). Boasting an eye-popping 620-HP in a lightweight chassis, RUF again delivered a car that could exceed 200 mph.

The Speed Yellow car in the center of this trio is a completely different take on the 993: the TechArt CT3 featuring a supercharger delivering 462-HP to the rear wheels. While any CT3 is rare on these shores, this one is particularly so as it's production number 000.
